clarity readings. These samples and readings are sent the DNR to monitor the lake health to spot warning trends over time.

Oxygen readings and other lake health topics:

It has been a long winter in Spooner, and long winters usually are not advantageous of Potato Lake. Oxygen readings have been low all winter, although we have seen similar readings in past winters.

Now that the ice is out on the lake, look for any dead fish in the area around your place. If you see any, please call me at 612-356-8525 or Dave Schmidt at 612-840-1656. By the way, Dave has graciously agreed to perform the oxygen readings in the future, and we thank him for stepping forward and providing this service.

We got some good news from Lisa Burns, Washburn County Conservation Coordinator, regarding water tests for zebra mussels. Last fall, Lisa was asked by the DNR to test a number of lakes in Washburn County for zebra mussel veligers. Veligers are the microscopic larvae of zebra mussels, so small that they are difficult to see with the naked eye. We took Lisa out on the lake and she took a number of water samples and sent them to the state labs. The report she received back indicated that no evidence of zebra mussels were found in Potato Lake.

Hopefully it will stay that way, and points up the value of the wash station we installed at the landing.

Winter Fish Kill:

Our ice out date revealed the hard winter we've been through. There were dozens of dead fish of all sizes along the east side of the lake. The last major winter fish kill was after the historic amounts of snow and bitter cold during the winter of 2013-2014.



Joe Adler has contacted the WI DNR. He guesses the DNR will come to the lake to do a shock survey to determine the extent of the die off. The DNR does not raise pan fish, so any restocking would need to involve private companies that are approved to raise fish for stocking in lakes. We have never had to get to this point in the past, so he's not sure how far the DNR will go if they find a total die off of any specific species.

We should have more information to share at the annual meeting.

The mystery of our snail problem – and a possible solution



It was in 2014 that the WI DNR first officially identified Chinese Mystery Snails (CMS) at Potato Lake. These banded snails are non-native snails that have been found in numerous Wisconsin lakes and elsewhere in the U.S. There is not a lot known about these species, however, it appears that they have a negative effect on native snail populations.

The literature says that CMS were brought to America as a food source (they are eaten in Asia – think escargot) – however many lakes have been infested because CMS eat algae. They were brought in to eat lake algae! That's why you see them floating on algae mats and living in rice beds.



I have seen a gradual increase in CMS populations over the past 15 years. I often see snails hitching rides on HUGE weed mats and algae mats and floating toward my dock. In the past, I would get in the water and use my rake to routinely take the entire mat out of the water and throw it on shore. It's heavy, exhausting work.



Last year I created a "swimming area" around my dock with floating barriers that I made out of corrugated drain pipe, floaties, end caps and rope. Materials cost around \$20 for each 10 foot section. They only weigh 3 pounds, so they're easy to move around. I put a 100 foot of barrier around my dock. It worked great to stop the snails and algae from floating into my dock and allowed me to harvest the snails from the water BEFORE they invaded my dock and sank into the muck and the rocks.

It appears to me that the snails are most vulnerable when floating in the water – it's exposed to predators and easily harvested. You may have other ideas – but what if we created barriers – at the southern and northern bays and trapped the snails and harvested them from the water – after the wind brings them there? That's what I did. It was easy. What if everybody was educated on how important it is to remove them - and helped remove every snail they see from the water when they see them? They are also good fish bait – better than worms! My friends caught several fish using snails.

That's my idea. You may have other ideas of how to trap them and harvest them. Hope this helps. I love Potato Lake – and I don't want it to turn into an algae infested snail infested nightmare!


